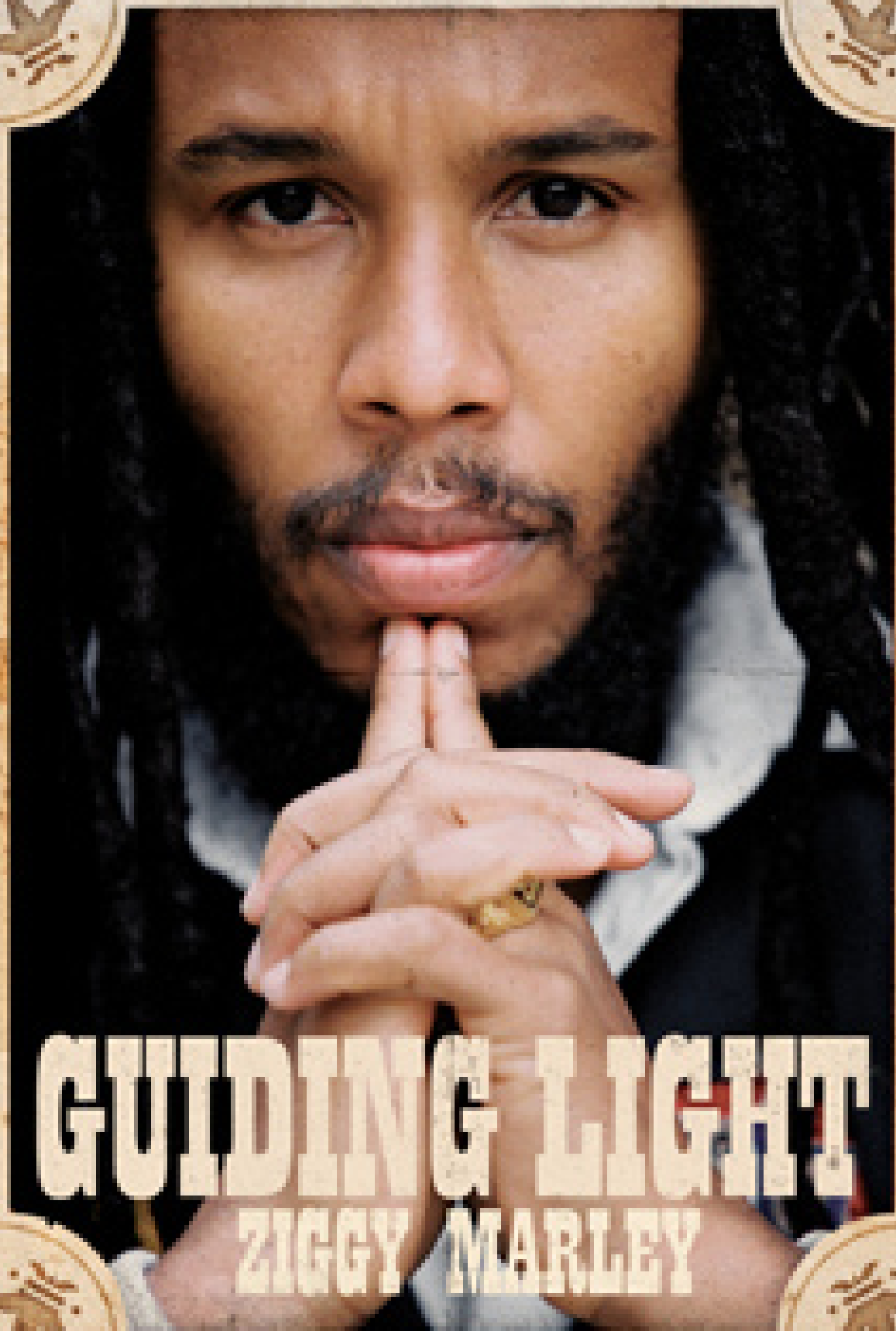

## Choppertown: The Sinners

“Brotherhood” is a word that comes up a lot in reference to motorcycles. There’s the “brotherhood of the road” all riders share and then there are the sub-brotherhoods of individual clubs, groups, gangs and friends. The Sinners are a California motorcycle club; Choppertown is family portrait in moving pictures.

To many, the men of The Sinners might look like a bunch of lowlife greasers, but this film shows them as talented craftsmen, artists, musicians (to varying degrees) — and above all, skilled bike and hot rod builders. Choppertown primarily uses the ground-up, hands-on construction of a prominent member’s newest motorcycle as the skeleton on which filmmakers Scott di Lalla and Zach Coffman build their disarmingly fleshy character sketches. The Sinners hug when they greet each other, have no problem kissing (usually on the cheek, occasionally on the mouth) and are always ready to lend a helping hand to a brother in need. It’s like an interesting episode of American Chopper starring people with more than half of a dimension.

One gets the feeling there might be a few more sides to this story, but this largely positive, honorable, romantic and occasionally nostalgic view of brotherhood, love and The Sinners motorcycle club puts Choppertown as a must-see for any road-brother or -sister. - **KND**
